REASON FOR CHOOSING THE INSTITUTION



It signifies that the college authority need to initiate policy for improving the quality education for the students.

It is clear from Table: 2 that 19% of the current year students have obtained 75% and above marks in the last qualifying examination. It has decreased by 2.5% in comparison to last year. It indicates that the quality of inputs has fallen to some extent.

Another noticeable fact is that the percentage of marks obtained 60% and above in the last year students was 26.5% and it has increased to 31% in the current year, 32.5% students secured below 60% marks in the last year and it has again decreased to 25.5% in the current year qualifying examination. 15.5% of last year students secured below 50% of marks, but the percentage of students who has obtained below 50% of marks in last qualifying examination in the current year has increased to 24.5%. It shows that the quality of education in current qualifying examination has been decreasing in comparison to last year examination. Teachers need to take appropriate initiative to improve the teaching learning process as well as all round development for imparting quality education in the college in future. Students also should be more focussed on their studies and take help of teachers to improve their knowledge base.

PERCENTAGE OBTAINED IN THE LAST QUALIFYING EXAMINATION



From the table: 3, it is found that 76 (38%) students out of 200 sample students of the current year (2018) give their comment that 75% - 90% of their syllabus has been completed in the class. 42 (21%) out of 200 students said that 90% to 100% of the syllabus has been taught in the class and 46(23%) students opted that 50% to 75% of their syllabus was completed in class.

But in the last year(2017) 68(34%) students were of the opinion that 90% to 100% of the syllabus was completed by teachers in the class, 74 (37%) of students have given their comment that 75%

to 90% syllabus was taught in class, 46 (23%) students were of the opinion that 50% to 75% syllabus was covered in the class. According to 36(18%) students, less than 50% syllabus was completed in the class.

The matter needs serious and urgent attention of the Academic Committee and the college authority and steps should be taken immediately to improve the situation on a priority basis.



In the last year (2017) 77.5% students were of the opinion that they are encouraged by teachers for participation in different activities but it has decreased in the current year to 69%.

The Feedback has revealed the following facts:

Maximum [98(49%)] students have chosen this institution for good environment. Most of the students [62(31%)] obtained below 60% of marks in the last qualifying examination. According to 42 (21%) students 75% to 90% of the syllabus was taught in the class. 134 (67%) students opined that the availability of library books regarding the course is sufficient. 110 (55%) students commented that the

teachers can communicate effectively. 144(72%) students said that teachers encourage students to participate in class. Teachers are very helpful in advising them in different matters as per the opinion of 115(57.5%) students. Most of the students [152(76%)] has no complain against any teacher.135 (67.5%) students are satisfied with the sanitation system of the college. According to 126(63%) students they are satisfied with the drinking water facilities provided by the college authority. Most of the students 134(67%) are unhappy with the college canteen. A good number of the students [89 (44.5%) are satisfied with the playground of the college. According to 138 (69%) of the students, teachers encourage them to participate in different activities other than those stated in the curriculum.

2. Goal:

Bihu is the indigenous festival of the people of Assam in connection with nature at various seasons of the year. There are three Bihu festivals, namely, Rongali Bihu, Kongali Bihu and Bhogali Bihu. Originally Bihu was celebrated amongst nature in open-air fields. But over the time Rongali Bihu has changed it's colour and has taken various forms and has become urbanised.



5. Evidence of Success:

The programme was successful as quite a number of students, teachers and people from around the college took part in the celebration.

Active participation from our students and ex- students and community people made the programme a success.

People who attended felt that more such programmes should be held in future. For the students outside Assamese community and taking part in the Bihu celebration it was a memorable experience with fun and festivity.

6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:

Most of the new generation people are not informed adequately about the original form of Bihu songs and dances and have a tendency to get swayed away to the modernised form of Bihu with which they are more familiar through the media.

The resources required were Bihu singers and dancers who have good knowledge about the original and undiluted forms of Bihu songs, dances and also traditional players of instruments to be played along the Bihu songs and dances.
